



Randy Browning...From the Bleachers

Interview with...

"Chuck Baliconis"

"Keyboardist on the move"

by Bob Jacobson

Tracking down Chuck for this interview was no easy task, but well worth the trouble. A veteran of over 20 bands, he provides some fascinating insights on what it's like to be a "Keyboardist on the move."

Part 1 A Profile...

Favorite Music...

Classical Rock, Progressive Rock and New Wave. No punk or acid rock or heavy metal!! I'll leave that to the ones still struggling with puberty. I also like Bach, Beethoven, and other classical music and I also love real tasty country rock.

Favorite Groups...

Yes, Kansas, Genisis, Supertramp, ELO, Thomas Dolby, Roxy Music, Asia, Toto, Prince, Simple Minds, Heads, Talking Rundgren, and so on. You get the idea. Music with intelligence behind it, not to mention power, and emotion. On the softer side I also like: Linda Rondstadt, The Eagles, Marshal Tucker, Cat Stevens, Dan Folgelburg, James Taylor, Simon and Garfunkel and so

Dislikes: Bubble Gum Music! No, Deadbeats and Drunks, Madonna, Michel Jackson, Boy George, or corny stuff in general. That's not to



say I don't play some of that stuff but I prefer to nudge people more towards music that's going to make them think a little and relate emotionally.

Interests...

Writing music, keeping in touch with friends through the mail, going to see other club band sand concerts, haunting music stores. My art work: I've been drawing since I was four years old and painting since I was about nine.

I chose music as a profession because I can make a little better living at it and I get a lot more of the feedback from people. I like to hear

about my work, positive or negative. I feel I can touch people on an emotional level a lot more with music and reach more people. I'm really a hard person to get to know well, so my music lets me express myself the best way I know how. Music is also a great challenge for me and doesn't come as easily as my art work. Party music is okay and great if you want fun music that you don't have to think about. I do some of that too, but I have a tendency to steer away from music that's real violent, satanic, sexualy lewd and drug music. There's a lot of depressing things on TV News and so on but I don't believe staying in a drugged out stupor

make our country any stronger and neither is negative, violent, abusive music. I take responsibility for what my music does to people because whether any one wants to admit it or not, us musicians do influence folks in a lot of ways. We have the mass media exposure and multi million even billion dollar record business to prove it! Its really to bad society in general has gotten a lot looser with their morals. Families are de-teriorating and so on. It really makes it hard to face reality, I just hope my music makes it a little easier to do just that and not make people want to hide from life or be defiant of whats going on around them. Its too easy to be out of touch and "party your life away" so to speak and ignor things. I wish more people just plain cared then maybe they wouldn't play and show all the numbifying crap they have on radio and TV. I don't listen to much radio or TV any more. There are still some excellent programs on both but I have to wade through so much bull to get to it. I know people in general have to make money, musicians, TV and radio people and club owners, car salesmen and right on down the line, but when money and power become more important than people and our resorces that's where I personaly draw the line!!! I think there's way too much throat slashing going on in the music business as well as our country and every where in general. Its good to know though, that there are still some honest, hard working, caring people out there who take responsibility for there works. I know most booking agents, musicians and club owners could make a big impact if they could just work together and take care of each other long enough to quit messing each other over!!! I would also like

to mention that I get a red carpet treatment where I work right now and that's why I've been where I am at for the last five months and that's why I practice and play hard and try my best to entertain the folks that come in and make my club owner happy. There is a lot of trust and good will where I work at the Ranch and the people that come in have been great. I hope this continues and that people will come and have fun with us. Good music, the best food in town, and an intimate atmosphere what more could you ask for!!!

instruments do you What play.?

Mainly keyboards, and my secondary instruments are bass and percussion.

How long have been playing? Eleven years.

When did you buy your first

keyboard?

I bought a Fender Roades electric piano 6 months after I took the piano up seriously. I was 15 when I started and only kid in school to own my own amps, keyboards, basses and percussion by the time I was a senior. I've been adding to that stuff ever since.

Are you classically trained? Aside from about 3 month's of lessons, half of which I didn't show up for, no. I did take some theory and choir in high school, but I have my own playing technique, and I'm basically self taught. Elton John and John Lord from Deep Purple influenced me quite a bit at first.

What do you consider a premier synthesiser?

There's a few actually. I'd like to get my hands on a Kurzwiel 250, which is a digital sampling keyboard for a little over \$10,000 $^{\circ 0}$, or the Emulator II is a similar type synthesizer for around \$8,600°. Closer to my budget still, I would like an Oberhiem 8 voice analog synthesizer or Memory Moog plus. Both are around \$3,000[∞].

What would you recomend for someone just starting to learn

keyboards?

A Korg poly six, a prophet 5 if you can find one, or maybe a Roland Juno 60. All are around the same price and produce good professional sound without much difficulty. I strongly suggest a good book on basic sound synthesis. Also some kind of piano type Instrument is a must for a beginner. Possibally a Yamaha PF 10, a Fender Roades Piano or a Wurlitzer electric piano. What do you recommend for

up and coming musician Start young. Learn to read, but also learn to use your ears and take theory!!! No matter what Instrument you end up on, take some piano. It makes everything else make more

sense, even the drums.

What kind of songs do you play?

Well, here at the Ranch, I'm doing a pretty good variety of top forty, light rock ,country, country rock, and folk.

Do you believe in doing the songs like the originals or do you improvise?

I do unless I can improve them, and if improving on them means changing them all around, then yes I well change them all around.

Okay, somebody walks up and offers you a record contract tomorrow and said you had a choice of the basic style of the record, what would you choose?

I'd want it to be a new sound, something unique. I'd want it to be a cross between progressive rock and progressive classical rock and maybe something really new wave and sort of a blend between that. And with an instrumentation and a vocal sound that maybe is unique from everything else. Like when Cindy Lauper came out, I would have to say it's basically like the 50's and 60's but it has a very driving beat behind it with lots of keyboards and she has a very unique voice, very, very likeable. Her music relates to a lot of people but its also done with some sophistication. Most folks would say Cindy's stuff is pretty simplistic, and for the most part it is. Lot's of bands can get up and bash that stuff out, where as I find the complexity is in the production. Producing that sound live, and having to program the keyboards, and use the correct effects is where the challange is. A lot of bands won't spend the extra time or have the proper equipment. That's why I have seven keyboards and am working on getting more. I want listeners to be able to dig a little deeper into the song and still find something, whether its a lyric content that has something really smart to say or the sutble little instrument part which most people don't pick up.

In some larger cities, it's common to see musicians, particulary jazz and free form styles, people who have been playing for 20 to 30 years and yet still play for 30 bucks a night at an off the wall night club and have a good time with

If they're happy with what they're doing the more power to them. I hope they have another source of income! I would enjoy a little security and if I want to live comfortably I

have to make a certain amount of money to support my festyle. I don't see myself in a bar 40 or 50 years old playing obscure music for little or no money and living with no security for the rest of my life and that's why I'm looking for a record contract, or a name act to play with while I'm still young and can aford to take chances and starve a little. Maybe, Eventually, I can have a moderate amount of success, and if that goes big, great, but if it doesn't its not going to hurt my feelings, at least I tried as hard as I could and got some experience. If somebody offered me a record contract tomorrow, for instance, and said we see you have talent and you can do this but, you've got to do it our way totally or you can't do it at all. It might sound crazy but I'd probably tell them to take a walk because if I don't have my heart into it and I don't have a big part in what's going on in there, what's the point. Unless I like the idea of the project well enough to take it on as a learning experience. Like I said, I like some security, but I won't sell myself out. If you're only motivation is to make money, go for it, you have my blessing. But that's not where I'm at. How much original material do

How much original material do vou have?

I've have about 12 songs right now that I'm working on. A few of those are finished Arrangement wise. I'm still looking for a lyrisist to put words to my songs. Out of the eleven years I've been playing, I've been spending so much time working, keeping my equipment up and learning songs that I just haven't taken or made the time, sacrificed the

time I should say to really get

down to my writing. I'm really

looking forward to taking a

year or two off and doing

nothing but writing and recording!

Could you tell me how many songs that you could sit down and play comfortably?

About two years ago I was playing in Whitehorse Canada and I sat in a hotel room with a typewriter for three weeks and figured out every song I've ever played in my career and now its probably up to over 1200-1300. That averages out to be about a 100 songs a year. I could comfortably play 75 to 100 of those songs, which is a very small percentage. You learn those songs and you play the hell out of them night after night but I'm just not the kind of person to remember them all. I've got certain favorite and standard songs that I remember and of course I remember all of my original material but I don't remember a very large percentage of all the stuff I've learned.

Can you tell us about your general direction? Is it all part of a master plan?

I don't know how much of a master plan I have. The main reason I came to Alaska was to make enough money to get the equipment I needed. I was looking for a little bit of isolation also. I wanted to get out of the regular music scene that I was part of and all the road work and stuff I've done. I've worked with over 20 bands. Some of them show groups, some of them lounge acts, some of them rock-n-roll bands. I just wanted to get away from all that long enough to save money to buy recording

equipment and have some time for myself to write songs. I'm trying to build up some momentum so I can be pretty much my own boss and be independent in future projects. This gig isn't any kind of an artistic statement other than the fact that its just me and I do a lot of the material that I want to


and I'm singing more than I ever have. Living here has provided me with a lot more opportunities and ideas to expand upon than I've had in the past. I'd like to get to a point financially and mentally in a lot of ways to where I can deal with other things from a lot more of an independent view point. I didn't have any dreams of staying in Alaska, I came up here purely to get away for awhile and to do better financially. However, since I came to Alaska I've grown to like it for a lot of reasons. I've stayed a lot longer then I'd planned to and will be staying for awhile longer.

Have you heard about the recent attempt by certain groups of people to censor certain records?

Yes.

What do you think about that? It's not the rating idea that bothers me, It's who's going to decide what's naughty and nice that I wonder about!

Would you care to elaborate? I think they should concentrate more on the budget and unfair taxes. I don't think it has anything to do with the record industry or the government, I think it has to do with families being families again and parents being good parents and being their own censors. The problem is you have two parents working these days and the parents expect schools and government to do all the censoring for them and MTV to do the babysitting at home! I believe that kids should be with at least one of the parents most of the time, and I think people have to be their own judge. The government getting involved and trying to censor movies, and records and books is really to much. What they're doing is taking away people's rights. If someone wants to go and watch these kind of things and lead his life that way that's his



going to interpret it. I think it

should be left up to the


individual. After all, doesn't

the constitution guarantee

freedom of expression? What

and demand of what people want to hear. I think its comunistic for the government to say well I'm sorry but we think you should watch this and you shouldn't watch that. The bottom line is, if somebody wants to put something satanic or violent in a song, well that's thier problem. I don't have to listen to it if I don't want to, and I can keep an eye on what my kids are taking in. I have the RIGHT to listen to what I want to. It's my choice. Why should anybody take that away from me!!!

2) always have an open attitude and be prepared for anything, 3)stay relaxed as often as


possible.

I give you an axample: 1 recently caught the attention of a few slightly unexpected dancers on a Wednesday night this week by proceeding to the dance floor guided by Charle's spot light and a late of fires in one hand, saucer of catsup in the other not to mention my guitar still on. The next 60 seconds I found myself engulfed by people in dire need of a food feast. The point I'm making-keep that "attitude" fresh.

You are a young martialartist who has returned home after years of study with a master of Karate. You find your village burned and princess Mariko, your bride-tobe, kidnapped. Journeying to the fortress of Akuma, the evil warlord who is responsible for this, you scale the cliff. So begins Karateka by Broderbund.

To begin with, the number of Karate moves is low, three kicks and three punches. Most are effective against any given opponent, allowing an opportunity to "mix it up".

Mixing it up can get dangerous later on, however, as your opponents' styles change and as they grow stronger. I found most of the early opponents had very predictable styles, though, which made them rather easy to defeat.

The game does have superb graphics (especialy with a color monitor). The background scrolls when you move forward or backward and the animation is very smooth. The sound effects are well done from the occasional background music to the kiai, (war cry), of the enemy.

The beggining and ending are done like the credits

of a movie, which adds the feel of having the part of the hero in a Karate flick.

The game is a lot of fun until you win, after which the novelty begins to fade. I would not recommend this to the advanced video game player as you will probably win the game in a few days time. However, if you are new to video games or have money to spend, Karateka is a very worthwhile game.

Works on Apple & Commador

Hard Hat Mack By Electronic Arts is an arcade game in the tradition of Donkey Kong, only much shorter. It has only three levels, of which only two offer any major challange to the experienced arcade gamer. They are, of course, the first two.

The object on the first level is to drop girders into the slots they fill and then rivet them into place. The trick is to dodge bouncing rivets, the OSHA inspecter, and the Vandal.

In the next level, you have to pick up toolboxes while riding a girder and a conveyor belt. You also have to sneak down to the lower level while avoiding a compacter and a random foe.

In the last level you have to put blocks of steel into a rivet maker while bouncing around on two springboards and avoiding the two guys. Although it's the most forgiving level, you do have to watch your timing on your jumps.

One of the nicest things about this game is the option

they have given you of playing any level you want, without having to play the other two. This helps you learn tricks to use on other levels and allows you to skip a level you haven't mastered or don't like.

If you have money to spend, Hard Hat Mack is a pretty good, no frills arcade game that will keep you busy for a few days to a few weeks. If you're looking for a lot of value for your money, though, this may not be the game for you.


