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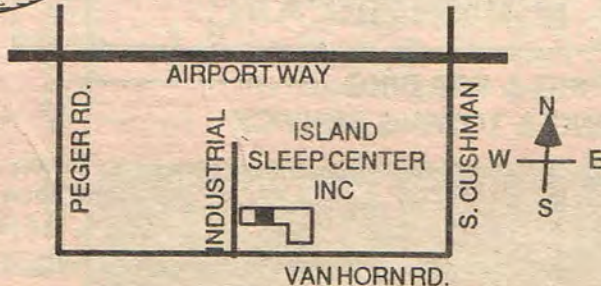

"Scion of the Paddleboat Clan"

When Charlie Binkley landed on the shores of Alaska, riverboating was in his blood by right of inheritance. The old paddlewheelers (stern wheelers, some called them) were a way of life -- just as they had been down in the lower 48 for his father before him.

It was 1898 and the territory was "busting out all over" with gold fever. At every port along the coast fortune hunters swarmed, licking their chops in anticipation of pockets lined with the yellow stuff. Skagway and Dyea were jammed with cheechakos. Any where a boat anchored on the waterfront, lines "Q'd" up begging transport to Nome and up the Yukon to the Canadian Bannanas, Dawson City and Whitehorse.

Men walked single file in hundred mile lines over Chilkoot Pass for the same destinations. Supplies for the camps became more precious as men's survival hung in the balance. Flour was \$250⁰⁰ for fifty pounds, and flour was far from all the camps needed.

It was time for the paddlewheelers to be on the move into the Arctic. It was time for men with courage, to defy the sifty sullen devious river up stream. The miners clamored its banks for supplies, and fortunes hung in the balance.

Charlie Binkley and his two brothers were there with the Nora, Vidette and the Hazel B. Today Captain Jim, Charlie's son and his wife Mary B, and his kids run the paddlewheelers on the Chena and the Tanana out of Fairbanks.

For eighty eight consecutive years this great river system has carried Binkley paddlewheelers on the Chena and the Tanana out of Fairbanks. The first 51 years as freight transports, the last 37 with tourists. The first was high adventure, the latter great fun. Alaskan visitors, homefolks, old and young spend a few hours

cruising the great flat bottomed boats into yesteryear, and they love it.

It was the May West that was the first to land at Dawson City docks, after spending the winter locked in Yukon ice below the Tanana. Her's was a rousing welcome and the 16 barrels of whiskey she carried sold immediately for one dollar a drink.

It was only the beginning. By September of 1898 56 vessels delivered 7,540 tons of supplies to Dawson City and 20 more of the big freighters were slapping their way up stream behind them.

Treacherous shifting sand and glacier silt beached more than a few, as Jim Binkley recalls that was inevitable. Hard labor and a sense of humor put them back in the water. One captain, watching his vessel going aground, yelled: "Shovel on the fuel, build up that steam and we'll get through, the sand is still wet!"

Paddlewheelers were credited with the ability to bounce on high water like a cork, and travel in water so shallow that a man falling overboard would land with a thud and kick up a cloud of dust.

And the old Phillip BeLow ran aground so much she earned the nickname: Fill-up Below.

Although 30,000 people and flour at \$250⁰⁰ for fifty pounds were a thing of the past on the main Yukon, and paddlewheelers were being abandoned, There was still a need for them 48 years ago when young Jim Binkley came to the Interior to go to University of Alaska. The scion of the paddlewheel clan who learned to handle the big river boats when he was so young he had to stand on a box to navigate went back to the business.

He was delivering freight when the only building on the Chena was where the Pump House Restaurant is now, and it was the mainstay of a multi-

million dollar local mining business.

Freight and supplies were trucked from Fairbanks end of track and piled on the Chena bank. Jim handled the big paddlewheelers with a couple of barges on ahead loaded with from 100,000 to 400,000 tons of freight. He made the run down the Tanana to the Yukon, and then as he said: "We turned left and went a thousand miles to the Bering Sea, or we turned right and paddled up river a thousand miles to Whitehorse." He made 10 trips a summer and each trip took two weeks.

The freighters used wood for fuel. It was seven dollars a cord, and considered insanely high priced. Wood cutters cut the trees into four foot lengths and stacked them at designated areas along the river. Business dealings were very informal. The wood cutter would simply leave a glass jar with the bill, and often a supply list, and the Captain would write a check or pay cash, deducting the cost of supplies.

Thirty seven years ago Jim Binkley and his wife Mary were encouraged by West Tours to begin excursions for tourists. Ben Eilason (who had his first and second plane mailed to Fairbanks by parcel post, and assembled them himself) was delivering the first airmail by 1921, and by the time Jim was talked into excursions for outsiders the air was full of freight and passenger planes. Miners could cut an air strip out of the bush, and didn't have to worry about getting supplies to camp before spring break up, instead they had to make sure the planes could set down without settling in for the duration.

The days of river romance had faded. We can only talk of the flamboyant Yukoner built in Victoria, assembled at St Michael and christened with champagne. She set out up river for the gold camps with musicians, actors, dance hall girls (a polite term) and gamblers. There was a generous cargo of hooch.

They dined and champagned the riverside miners and wood choppers, but most of the passengers and crew are long forgotten. Not so for the Charlie Binkley clan, for the river boats and their Captains opened up the Alaska interior treasure trove. Today we can drift down river on the Discovery (and there will soon be three of them) and part the curtains on a past that might just be the greatest in Alaska's history. It's a great heritage, and Jim Binkley, for one can make it come alive for us. ■

Food has been brought to our streets by people with a heart felt desire to see Fairbanks come alive in the summer. These people are known as street vendors. They choose as their livelihood a "fun" "festive" & for the most part "profitable" occupation. They roll by with hot dogs, fill burritos in a tiny kitchen and foam up fresh espresso under the sun, rain or come what may.

Carl of "Carls Burrito Wagon", came to Alaska in early 1974 to cook in a 25 man camp. He started in business as a boy selling newspapers door to door. "All I knew was door knocking and that you made a living by selling something," he recalled. After World War Two he started cooking in a hotel, "It seemed like a natural thing for me to do," he reported. Sometime around 1977-78 he designed his burrito wagon which he currently owns & operates through the summer, on 3rd st. across from the Gavora Mall. (See restaurant listings for hours). Go by sometime & try his "giant" size burritos & 100 yr old lemonade recipe. He serves them up with a smile & interesting conversation.

Bill St. Pierre was one of

the first mobile street vendors in Fairbanks. He ran a little hot dog cart in the downtown area for two summers. Although it was a lot of hard work it was an "enjoyable & profitable" time for him, he says. But getting on with new business ventures led him to sell the cart to a "Chicago Boy" named Val. Val has a partner named Ed, so the cart is now appropriately named, "Val-Ed Hot Dogs." Although the partners had a difficult time securing permits and meeting health regulations they are in operation this summer downtown on 3rd & Cushman during lunch time. They also cover as many ball games & special events that they can. "Great Hot Dogs" & "Cold Sodas," are their specialties.

On the river next to the visitors center is another special mobile treat, an Espresso Machine. Elizabeth Holl came up with the idea to provide this warming service to our community & tourist trade. Her partner Meredith Lesley tells me she had some swiss visitors tell her the espresso was the "best" they'd had in this country! The two women plan to stay in operation through Sept. & hope to get some things going this winter. So as you stroll through downtown be sure and try one of their specialty flavors. ■

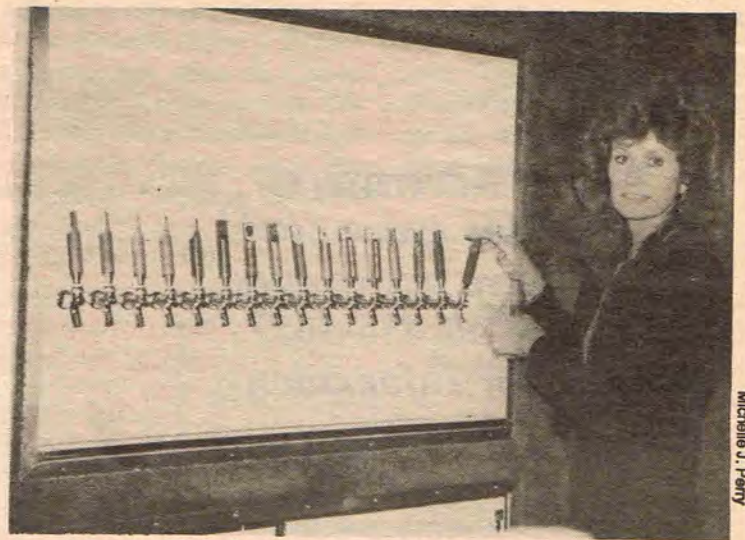
On the advice of a friend I decided to check out Reflections, the newest nightclub in Fairbanks. "Take your girlfriend with you," he said. "It's a

but occasionally glance at the dancers in the cages. There are 2 large, black-rebar wire cages, one on each side of the stage, that house a male dancer and a female dancer respectively. The idea here is to reduce people's inhibition toward dancing and get them out on the floor. I envisioned American Bandstand dancers behind bars.

A band concert with cannons will greet Fairbanks' July 4 celebrations when "C" Battery, 1st Battalion, 37th Field Artillery joins the Fairbanks Community band in concert on Fort Wainwright. 105mm Howitzers will add to the sounds of Tchaikovsky's "1812 Overture," and the band will provide a range of traditional patriotic music, show tunes and other concert pieces. 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Ray Funk's The Arctic Turntable

This month I want to talk about some of the great recent country records especially the "New Wave" of country singers who are going back to the older styles of country singing and some fine records out of New Orleans.

The hottest newcomer in country music is Dwight Yoakim. He issued an EP on a small label out of LA only to have it picked up by Warner Bros and had the EP filled out to be a great LP, Guitars, Cadillacs Etc. Etc. (Reprise 25372-1). The album is getting lots of attention moving up the country charts, as is Yoakim himself, having an article about him in a recent issue of Rolling Stone and being featured on the PBS TV show, Austin City Limits. His voice has that twang missing from so many recent country-politan singers. The recordings are clean and lean honkytonk arrangements. But best of all the songs are memorable. Yoakim wrote everything on the album except for memorable covers of "Honky Tonk Man", "Great Balls of Fire," and "Heartaches by the Number." My favorite is the great drinking song "It Won't Hurt" with its memorable chorus:

It won't hurt when I fall down from this bar stool

And it won't hurt when I stumble in the street

It won't hurt 'cause this whiskey eases misery

But even whiskey cannot ease your hurting me

If you like the honky tonk end of country and were wishing George Jones would go back to the sound he had in the fifties or sixties, try this great new album. I give it my highest recommendation.

It is important to know that Yoakim is not an isolated phenomenon but is part of a movement in Los Angeles of young bands and singers who are trying to return country music to a cleaner stronger sound. The classic anthology of these artists is the not easy to find A Town South of Bakersfield (Enigma 72059-1). Try Roundup Records, P.O. Box 154, N. Cambridge, MA 02140.

The record is well worth the effort. Put together by Pete Anderson (bass guitar for Yoakim) and Dan Fredman, it is a delight and features the various new country singers and bands from the L. A. area. Besides Yoakim, it features great guitarist Albert Lee who has been featured with Emmy Lou Harris and Eric Clapton.

But it is the unknowns on the album who in their first recordings are all stunning. Both female vocalists Katy Moffat and Kathy Robertson are very good. I am very fond on both Tin Star's "Happy Hour", a tear jerker that asks the essential question, "Why do they call it Happy Hour" and George Highfill's "Waiting Up."

Now regrettably for an album that I can only give a mixed review to is Emmy Lou Harris's Thirteen (Warner Bros. 25352). Over the years she has put on many great live shows I've attended and about half of her dozen previous albums are classics to my mind. Regrettably, of the last three or four LP's, I find a few strong cuts but the rest of the album I'm lukewarm about. That is the situation with her new one. She does a fine job on the Cajun number, "Lacassine Special", a good duet with John Anderson and the best cut is the Merle Haggard and Bonnie Owens composition, "Today I Started Loving You Again."

A fascinating and delightful double album that has been out for a couple years now is Terry Allen's Lubbock (on everything) Fate 001. Allen is an artist and sculptor who got in to writing some fun country songs and this 1979 album is a collection of songs about such unlikely subjects as trucks of art burning near the highway, the Wolfman of Del Rio (famous radio DJ), walking out on oneself, having to take a blue collar job when you are an artist and the Future Farmers of America. The sound is stone country, the lyrics are a gas and everyone I play it for falls in love with this record. Allen has done three other albums and I hope they are one tenth as good and I am ordering them today. The only place I know that carries his records are Roundup.

In the area of classic country reissues, the album I am most excited about this month is Ray Price The Honky Tonk Years 1951 - 1953 (Rounder SS 22). A classic selection of issued and unissued cuts, many feature Hank Williams band. The songs are good, the recordings remastered lovingly for great sound and the whole LP is put together with an obvious lot of care. I hope they go and do a similar job on the early Carl Smith or Faron Young. All three artists who produced some great music before the sixties buried their sound in too much production.

Now, as to New Orleans, we can thank Rounder Records who is pushing some great New

Orleans R&b under the series, New Orleans Modern Masters. The greatest of these to my mind is their second album on Johnny Adams After Dark (Rounder 2049). He is a classic soul singer who has been putting out records for 20 years and it was so so material that marred the last album from being truly great. This LP features some fine songs by John Hiatt and Doc Pomus. His version of "Do Right Woman - Do Right Man" manages to make you forget the Aretha original, an accomplishment in itself. The sound is tight and just works perfectly. This is an album I want to rave about to everyone, to play over and over again. If you like soul, this is not to be missed.

Also, if you like soul, keep an eye out for Peter Guralnick's book, Sweet Soul Music just out from Harper and Row. It is a fine book to get both the history and the feelings behind the rise of Southern soul in the sixties. Moving from the blues, R&b, and gospel roots of Ray Charles, Sam Cooke, and James Brown this book is a very revealing portrait of the rise and fall of artists like Otis Redding, Aretha Franklin, and less known but wonderful singers like James Carr. The book covers the artists, the companies and the writers. The book forms the third of his triptych on roots of American music following his excellent earlier books, Feel Like Going Home and Lost Highways.

But, I digress, and there are other New Orleans records to report on. The most high energy is the Dirty Dozen Brass Band Mardi Gras Live at Montreux (Rounder). This is their second LP and they have been hitting all the major festivals and even appear in the latest Neiman-Marcus catalog. But despite being too chic and the latest fad, their popularity is based on their infectious mix of taking traditional brass band music and rhythm and blues. The hottest of a dozen young ensembles providing great dance music and taking their material as easily from Monk as from Professor Longhair. The new releases by Red Tyler Heritage (Rounder 2047) and Irma Thomas The New Rules (Rounder 2046) are both good but aren't up to the level of these other two. Irma Thomas has one of the best live shows around and while her new album has several excellent songs, the album just doesn't carry the punch of her best material.

Although not part of the series, another related strong Rounder release is Buckwheat

Zydeco's Waiting for My Ya-Ya (Rounder 2051). A Zydeco release buy one of Clifton Chenier's former sidemen, this is a fine album drenched in soul and R&b. Besides doing Fat Domino's "Walking to New

Orleans" and Lee Dorsey's "Ya Ya", Buckwheat reworks the Dirty Dozen's theme song, "Feet Don't Fail Me Now". All sparkle and this is another album I like a lot. ■

It's July Food Fans, picnic time! I'll bet you're all getting invited to lots of picnics & BBQ's these days, and most of them are probably the "pot luck" kind. Those are always such fun and a great opportunity to learn & share new recipes. Here's a couple of salads that I like to take along.

Potato Poppy Seed
4 cans baby new potatoes
(or boil fresh)

1 8 oz sour cream

1/4 c poppy seeds

1 tsp garlic salt

1/2 tsp white pepper

Drain & rinse potatoes, & chop into bite size pieces. If you boil your own you may choose to leave the skins on. Mix the potatoes with the sour cream, add poppy seed & seasonings. Stir until well mixed. Chill at least 1 hour and stir before serving.

Pea Salad

26 oz pkg frozen peas

1/2 lb. Cheddar Cheese

1 Med green pepper

1/2 med onion

1 cup mayonaisse

1/2 tsp black pepper

Thaw peas, chop green pepper & onions into pea size squares. Cut the cheddar into cubes about twice the size of the peas. Toss together with the mayonaisse & season with pepper. Chill & stir before serving.

The Business Side

How do I know when it is time to computerize my growing business, and how much should I expect to pay?

I will assume we are talking about micro computers. The price of a new computer system for record keeping and accounting for a business should be about 2% of your company's annual sales. Therefore, a \$100,000 a year business should expect to pay approximately \$2,000 for a system with program(s). Understand that the most important thing about a computer system is the program (software) not the machine. Shop for programs that do what you need done, then buy the computer that will run that program. In general you get the best advice and demonstrations from someone who owns and has been using the software. Yes, better than the computer salesman. (This is because your average computer salesman must be able to demonstrate dozens or even hundreds of programs and just doesn't

have the time to learn each and every one expertly). Also budget for a service contract with the local retailer. This is usually worth the extra cost. Take your time - don't make a snap decision. Ask a lot of questions of everyone. A ready-to-run self contained system with tested program packages is probably the best for your first business computer.

Do I have to pay a bill for products mailed to my business that I did not order? Should I return them and pay the return postage?

No. You don't have pay the postage or even send the products back. A seller of products cannot send you or your business unordered merchandise and require you to pay or send it back. Under federal law you may keep or even sell the products and keep the money. Check closely that no one in your organization OK'd the shipment, or that your company did not agree (through the small print on another order) to an

"automatic shipment" program. If your company did not make the order, you are within your rights to keep the shipment and do as you please with it. A few companies will try this trick because a large number of people will pay the bill or send the goods back at their own expense. Another variation of this ploy is to send the bill without ever shipping anything, in the hopes that the shipped to company is so lax in it's record keeping it will pay the bogus bill. It is a sad fact that many businesses pay these bills without even checking. The latest rip-off trend is to send in a phony charge on your bank card. That is why you should be

very weary of who you give your bank card number to, especially by phone to a party that called you first. In this instance never give out your bank card number, no matter how good the prize sounds. If this invoice/card charge without delivery happens to you report the offending business to the Alaska Attorney Generals office.

I have heard bankers talk about a pro forma balance sheet in support of a business loan. What does "pro forma" mean?

The phrase is Latin meaning "a matter of form." The pro forma balance sheet is a projected or planned picture of how the assets and liabilities of a business would look, if it were es-

tablished. If the company is already established, the pro forma balance sheet would project the financial condition after a major change. ■

Have you searched for ways to explore by improvising around the melody and chords of a given form in music? To play jazz, when it is all written on score, arranged, like big band charts or the fake books now on the market, skills and drills, musical cliches -- as you can see, many publishers are presenting methods and ideas for helping the student learn to "play jazz".

I cannot judge the systems I've seen and tried to teach with or the many cassettes, computers and push button keyboards. We can learn from most any collection, the market is loaded with gimmicks. Electronic innovations have added to the amazing information glut.

In the past years I enrolled in an art course with Famous Artists correspondence school. Through out each chapter the twenty four famous artists that taught each chapter reiterated constantly, the simple advice "You learn to draw by drawing!" "You learn to paint by painting!"

So you learn to play jazz by playing jazz. Some common

sense structure, discipline and necessary private lessons, schooling & hard work, but the bulk of the teachers will honestly stress that you find a quiet place & wood shed your own ideas.

I say this so you will realize I have no illusions about my particular graphic illustrations, chord studies and techniques. What I wish to present cannot even be taken literally. Jazz is abstract like modern art and about the time you find a few answers you are pretty apt to tire of the plateau your stuck on & you will venture to new terrain.

So I will try to stick to basics, innovating only in my method of presentation. Trying to teach someone by one to one is a time consuming endeavor. By publication it can be even more frustrating.

All I can advise is persistence, seclusion and a will to learn. Seclusion helps to spare the the sanity of those around you. My teacher used to advise-"practice at home". He could have added "alone". Spare the listener.

We will throw information at you & hope you save the charts and we will always refer back to the keyboard teaching aids.

The main subjects will be chord structure and ear training, using solfeggio- so start to sing do` re` me` .

Playing an instrument is an extension of our mental process of singing - therefore learn to sing in your head. Also, picture the location of the note on the keyboard or use the syllables do` re` me` fa` so` la` ti` do`. They are movable from one key to the other like the acetate lays over on a weather map.

By the way pick up some acetate at your business office store as we will be offering a self teaching method with a printed key board for a desk-top study. You can find many chords in fact all you want, with out a keyboard, HOWEVER- Keyboards are easy to come by these days. Try to find a small one you can afford & make sure it has over two octaves. GOOD LUCK! ■

In October of 1985 a group of people from the restaurant and beverage industry in the interior of Alaska got together to fight another one of the many abuses suffered by their industry - a 5% sales tax on alcohol in the city of Fairbanks.

There were over 50 license holders at this original meeting. Out of this meeting the INTERIOR RESTAURANT & BEVERAGE ASSOCIATION, I.R.B.A., was formed. Officers elected on that day were assigned the task of repealing the new Fairbanks city sales tax on alcohol.

There was little time to organize back in October of 1985. Not enough to convince the citizens of the interior city of Fairbanks that the alcohol tax was discriminatory. The repeal action was defeated by the voters, the alcohol tax remains on the books.

The restaurant & beverage industry had strong opposition. City council members threatened to raise the hell out of property taxes if the alcohol tax was repealed. The Fairbanks M.A.D.D. chapter president was on the news supporting the alcohol tax. City employees testified for the alcohol tax fearing loss of wages & benefits if the tax were removed from the books.

The opposition was a select few who tarnished the image of this industry to the extent that voters supported a penalty against the industry rather than a sales tax.

ENOUGH IS ENOUGH!!

I.R.B.A. was formed to:

- Create positive public relations for the licensed restaurant & beverage industry
- Provide professional training for those in the industry
- Generate industry support from newly elected borough, City and State officials
- Perpetrate industry support from local clubs, sport groups and nonprofit organizations.

The time to act is now. I.R.B.A. will be launching major community projects in our interior communities that will open the eyes of those who do not see the valuable service this industry can provide.

Our motto is "PLUM LOCAL". Good-bye United Way - hello local needs! We will help ourselves by helping those in need in our LOCAL areas. We will be assisting our local nonprofit organizations in gaining the necessary funding to operate as effective organizations in the interior of Alaska.

The tools to accomplish this already exist. I.R.B.A. will be acting as the hub for local organizations. Look out interior Alaska - we are about to knock your socks off!

I.R.B.A. is calling many interior sport associations (darts, pool, racing, horseshoe, softball etc.) in an effort to unite the administrative functions of each organization under one roof - cutting costs and opening up lines of communication that never before existed. Imagine the support of so many organizations working together. It's PLUM LOCAL I tell ya.

The Elks, Eagles and the American Legion have joined the ranks of the I.R.B.A. Besides complimenting the goals of I.R.B.A. their leadership and support is a welcome sight. Many more will join us, they want to help even more than they are helping now.

The PLUM LOCAL project will work. It will circulate many dollars many more times in those interior communities in need. The interior economy is down so we will work to assure the dollars earned in our communities stay in the community.
